Welcome Our Newest Staff Members

Grace Shyng, Interim Executive Director, recently sat down with four new staff members to find out what makes them tick! Here are their compelling stories:

Jodi Birley, Communications Coordinator:

Jodi was born and raised in Regina, Saskatchewan. Jodi is part of a multi-generational Deaf family and has proud roots in Deaf heritage. When Jodi started public school, there were no services for signers. At that time, public education in the province only supported oral (non-sign language) programs. Jodi's parents advocated strongly for ASL services, rallied their community for support and championed the inclusion of Sign Language interpreting services in the school. As a result of their hard work and determination, the Regina School Board acknowledged the importance of Sign Language. They set up a Total Communication program that include all different approaches in the instructions for deaf and hard of hearing children at the time when Jodi was in preschool. Jodi had positive experience learning both ASL and speech, but she chose ASL as her primary language to thrive.

Favourite Movie: Jodi doesn't have a favourite, but loves thrillers.

Favourite Food: She loves to cook and enjoys all types of food, especially Thai food.

Jodi's Dream Job: Jodi's older sister Dawn is in theatre. They hope to advance opportunities for the signing community in the arts by integrating digital media and theatre into a hub centre that aims to educate and inspire the public about the beauty of the sign language community, and its rich Deaf Culture and heritage. Go for it, Jodi!

After high school in 1998, Jodi attended Gallaudet University where she graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Communication Studies. Following graduation, Jodi moved to Vancouver and worked as a child care counsellor in the dormitories under the Ministry of Children and Families for almost five years, and then moved to become a Youth and Child Care Worker at the British Columbia School for the Deaf for almost 11 years.

Advocacy for the Deaf has always been the forefront of Jodi's passions. Starting in 2011, Jodi became actively involved in a national movement that successfully advocated for Video Relay Services in Canada, which was launched in September 2016. As a result of her and her colleagues work, Video Relay Services are now a free service for everyone

(including the hearing population) in Canada, who needs a Sign Language interpreter to communicate on the phone between signers and non-signers. Anyone can make a phone call with an ASL interpreter readily available.

Jodi was recently hired as the first Communications Coordinator for WIDHH in February 2019. In her role, Jodi will utilize her extensive experience in videography to ensure all of WIDHH's communications will be accessible by the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. This includes having vlogs throughout our website and on our social media messages. With Jodi's help, WIDHH is going to change the landscape and impact of communication accessibility.

Barrington Harrison, Community Interpreting Services (CIS) Booking Coordinator:

Barrington was born and raised in Toronto, Ontario. As a teen, he was always interested in drama and acting, and enjoyed studying literature. He was also very interested in Sign Language as well.

During high school and after graduation, Barry joined a few talent agencies, and worked as an extra on some very interesting TV shows, including Degrassi: The Next Generation! Barry pursued his interest for Sign Language by enrolling in the ASL and Deaf Studies Program at George Brown College and completed the program in 2011.

In 2013, Barrington moved to Winnipeg and lived there for two years. He pursued Deaf Studies at Red River College and worked as an intervenor. After completing the Deaf Studies program, he worked for Deaf Centre Manitoba as a building attendant and for New Directions as a support worker. He worked with people from a variety of different backgrounds, and was able to use Sign Language regularly.

In 2015, Barrington moved to BC and enrolled in the Sign Language Interpretation program at Douglas College. Later in 2017, he decided to take some time off to gain more experiencing using Sign Language and working with the Deaf community.

Barrington has now joined WIDHH as our Community Interpreting Services Booking Coordinator, to cover for a one year maternity leave. He also works part-time as a barista and jack-of-all-trades at Starbucks. He regularly spoils the WIDHH staff with Starbucks treats!

Barrington is friendly, lively and has a big personality. He owns 13 pairs of colourful prescription glasses. He has been a wonderful addition to our Interpreting team!

Grace Straw, Job Developer:

Grace's family is from Terrace, but when her mother was about to give birth, she travelled to Vancouver to deliver at BC Women's Hospital (formerly called Grace Hospital). Grace and her twin brother Jeff were in the spotlight when they were born. A TV station did a feature story of the birth of the twins from Terrace who had travelled all the way to Vancouver to be born. Grace's mother still has the news clip on VHS!

Grace was born profoundly deaf and during her early years in public school, her parents worked hard to seek support for Grace. Terrace did not have a lot of support services for children with hearing loss. Her parents set out to learn ASL, obtained closed captioning for the TV and they were able to find a CODA (Child of a Deaf Adult) fluent in Sign Language to work with Grace when she was in school, since registered interpreters were not available in Terrace at that time. When Grace was 9 years old, she received a Cochlear Implant from BC Children's Hospital and over the years, worked with a speech-language pathologist to strengthen her oral and listening skills.

Growing up, Grace was an accomplished athlete in many sports. She even had the honour playing for Team Canada's basketball team for the Canadian Deaf Sports Association at the Pan American Games held at Gallaudet University 2006. After high school, Grace studied at Coast Mountain College in Terrace and later relocated to Vancouver where she finished her studies at Simon Fraser University (SFU). In December 2018, she graduated from SFU with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology. She is now currently working towards completing SFU's Human Resources Management Certificate.

Given her strong parental role models, Grace has also become a tireless advocate for communication accessibility in all aspects of her life. As a student at Coast Mountain College, Grace wrote letters and met with the College

President, to successfully advocate for an increase in the College's accessibility services, which benefited all students with disabilities attending Coast Mountain College.

Grace has also written letters to government and various organizations asking them to consider improving their contact access to more than just a voice phone number. She has also encouraged the provision of email, text and the use of interpreters or CART services for appointments and meetings.

In April 2019, Grace joined the WIDHH Counselling department as a Job Developer. Grace's personal experiences with hearing loss and successful self-advocacy have been another amazing addition to our team.

Tax Night Success and Appreciation

After speaking with some of the accountants and interpreters, many expressed their pleasure in being able to give back to the community. Staff from the CRA were also here helping the accountants, and they were so impressed by the community spirit throughout the evening.
